From our Diocesan President

Sisters, I hope you have seen the article in the Summer 2008 *Covenant Magazine* regarding Daughters of the King. I wrote it to encourage women of our Diocese to consider joining us. Of course, **YOU, MY SISTERS, ARE THE REAL KEY TO THAT MISSION'S SUCCESS.** And, we are best prepared for that mission as our own lives reflect what our Lord Jesus Christ has called us to be.



We are women and we are Christians. We have promised to pray and serve our church and our neighbors. We have promised to evangelize, bring others to Christ. And how have we done these things? By paying attention to prayer and service and spreading the good news as we have seen fit. How will we grow in, and into, fulfilling these promises? St. Teresa of Avila (1515-1582) walked this path a long time before us. She wrote *The Interior Castle* to help her sisters to grow in their spiritual lives. She pictured the soul as “a castle made of a single diamond... in which there are many rooms, just as in heaven there are many mansions.”

St. Teresa and her sisters were cloistered nuns and we are not, but others have followed a similar path that applies well to our busy lives. Elizabeth Gilbert, for example, in her best-selling book, *Eat, Pray, Love*, challenged herself to pray more deliberately. Prayer can get limp and boring after a while, she found. So, she comments that prayer is a relationship with God and that she will take time every morning to search within herself for an “authentic prayer,” that for which she is truly asking on that day. Having recognized that desire, she then prays in a meditative style, very much like centering prayer. An excellent source for that type of prayer is *Centering Prayer and Inner Awakening* by Cynthia Bourgeault.

Through prayer and service, we move through the mansions that St. Theresa describes. She made clear that humility is required to make this journey. The major obstacles to our progress are our own distractions with the world in which we live and with our attachment to our material lives. We are so easily consumed by resentment, anger, envy, loneliness, and fear that we have to be reminded that we are seeking the true light of God in the world and in ourselves. Sisters, I do recommend the spiritual paths of these women. They go before us with a lantern to light the way. By following their paths of dedication to the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, we will become evangelists by virtue of the way we live our lives and tell our stories. This will enhance the community of our sisters, of our churches, and, ultimately, of the world.

Community, Prayer, and Technology

These three apparently disjointed words swim in my mind following a very exciting and productive Spring Assembly and the Board Meeting leading up to it. My hope is to suggest how they fit together as a challenge for the common life of the Daughters of the King in our Diocese and for our mission to pray and serve in the larger Church.

In her May 3rd reflections on “Make Us One,” Mother Anita began with the premise that the oneness for which Christ prayed in his Priestly Prayer of John 17: 20-23 is a restoration of unity with God such as existed at creation and is as complete as that unity within the Holy Trinity. Wow! That’s a much larger vision of unity and community than I usually think of or can even imagine in the face of all that can often divide us as Daughters, as Christians, and as humans! How can we take even baby steps in this direction?

My thoughts turn to the meeting that took place in Egypt between our diocesan Bishop Steven Miller and Bishop Mouneer Anis over a week that included the day of our Assembly. Through the use of **technology** (email), we Daughters had been able to join in a **community of prayer** to uphold and support those involved in this endeavor. We used the occasion of our semi-annual Board meeting to complete prayer shawls to be given to participants in this meeting as signs of our continual prayers. The card that accompanied them said, “These prayer shawls are symbolic of all of our prayers to support your efforts to maintain the bonds of affection and to discern the heart and mind of Christ in the Anglican Communion and its relationship to the Episcopal Church. . . . Know that these shawls have been lovingly prayed over by women who hold a wide diversity of views on the matters in contention, and yet who deeply yearn for unity in Christ.” Baby steps on our part, recognizing that only the mysterious Trinity has the ability to create order from the chaos around us.

At the business portion of our Assembly, President Lela Joscelyn discussed the different ways we hope to use **technology** (email and a web site) to strengthen our

bonds of **community** and our service of **prayer**. We will rely much more heavily upon email and the internet for the dissemination of communications, prayer requests, and Lifelines. Yet we are mindful that such reliance could separate sisters who do not have computer access from a sense of community. Therefore, I urge those with email access to look through the revised directory (which will be sent out shortly) to see whether there is anyone in their parish or nearby for whom they could print out and share communications. Essential baby steps toward efficiency and stronger community.

Speaking about the revised directory at the Assembly, I noted the continued growth that we see in the number of members and chapters in the past three years. Yet we also have quite a large number of Daughters at Large, which presents us with a challenge to connect and build community with them. I especially wish to remind these daughters of the National Bylaws stating that if there is a chapter in the church they attend, they ought to be a part of that community. Pray for the Holy Spirit to reconcile any hurts and to raise the Daughters up as examples of loving and forgiving community. If there is not chapter, we encourage Daughters at Large to consider forming one, and are more than willing to provide assistance.

And why do we seek such growth? First, for the sake of multiplying the prayer support being offered to the Church in its various manifestations at this critical time. Second, so that greater community among the diversity of Daughters may be a witness to the unity made possible in Christ. Our vows of prayer, service, and evangelism and our devotion to our King can be baby steps toward unity among the various religious traditions we now represent – Episcopalian, Anglican, Catholic, and Lutheran.

One last bit on **technology**. Through the gracious and skilled ministry of Loraine Garner (Elizabeth Chapter of St. James Milwaukee), we now have our own diocesan web site at www.milwaukeedok.org. Please keep your sisters throughout the diocese in mind whenever you have an event or study idea to share, taking pictures and emailing them to Loraine at lifelines@milwaukeedok.org to incorporate into the web site or Lifelines. If our web site shares the joy of being a Daughter and how we strive for unity with God and one another, perhaps more women will be attracted to our Order.

Finally, I share that my passion for the Daughters in our diocese is to strengthen our prayer and community by reaching out to visit each chapter on behalf of the diocesan leadership. I bring you the love and prayers of Lela, Kay, Jill, and myself and hope to gather insights and “best practices” to share with other chapters. If your chapter is struggling in some way, perhaps we can prayerfully discern how to strengthen the community. This vision cannot come through technology, however, but through old fashioned baby steps (or adult journeys) to meet one another face to face and heart to heart. Please use the **technology** of email (peg.nugent@sbcglobal.net) or the good old fashioned phone (262-796-1578) to make plans for a visit.

Milwaukee Daughters and the Lambeth Conference

On Saturday, August 2nd, as the world-wide gathering of Anglican bishops at Lambeth gave its final consideration to the on-going unity of the Anglican Communion, the Rev. Canon David Pfaff led a group of Daughters of the King and parishioners of St. Bartholomew Church in a mass for the Unity of the Church. At one point in the service, the palpable presence of the Holy Spirit prompted one person in attendance to stop her singing and “Listen.” What she discovered was the tremendous beauty God can bring from even the *a cappella* singing of relatively few voices. “Listen,” she heard, and so she could better appreciate the unique gifts of the others at worship, and how the Holy Spirit could unite them all into unity in diversity.



Listening was also part of what made this Lambeth Conference different from many others. The bishops were encouraged to meet in small communities (African Indaba groups) and to discern the mind of Christ in forming relationships that transcend the barriers of geography or the anxieties that can be festered by global communication technology. In his sermon, Fr. David Pfaff alluded to the ways that the internet, blogs, and instant communication may actually hinder the work of the Spirit because they distance communication from listening in relationship. A bit of wisdom well worth remembering in our own lives. When in doubt, when anxious, when feeling out of relationship with others – pause to pray, and then Listen – to God and to the other.

Prayer, listening, and relationship in support of the world-wide Church have been an important part of our diocesan ministry as Daughters this year. When we learned of the Bishop’s planned journey to visit Archbishop Mouneer Anis in Egypt this Spring, we Daughters pledged to pray for this time of listening and relationship-building. We also crafted and sent along prayer shawls that were prayed over by Daughters from the full spectrum of theological views. It was during the time of Bishop Miller’s visit that Archbishop Mouneer sent a letter to his fellow bishops in Africa and the Southern Cone, indicating that he would not be attending the Global Anglican Fellowship Conference and encouraging all bishops to take part in the Lambeth Conference. Is there any doubt that prayer, relationship, and listening may have impacted his decision?

In listening to the Spirit in our hearts, the leadership of the Diocesan Daughters agreed to share materials on Lambeth with all Daughters in the diocese and to call for prayer in a special way to undergird Bishop Miller and the others as they met from July 16 through Aug. 3rd. Daughters were able to arrange to be part of at least 5 extra Holy Eucharists and one celebration of Evening Prayer during this time, in addition to Sunday worship and daily praying for those convened at Lambeth. At the special Eucharist he celebrated with us, Fr. Pfaff extended his thanks for all this prayer support from the Daughters.

And yet our prayers of support are not ended, but just beginning – as is the work of the Holy Spirit to bear fruit from the meetings at Lambeth. Romans 28: 18-28 is an excellent guide for this ongoing ministry of prayer we can offer for our Church. St. Paul reminds us that our sufferings are part of laboring to give birth to the reign of God. In these labors, we must hold on to hope and wait **PATIENTLY**. Finally, he reminds us that we are not groaning in labor alone. Rather, the Holy Spirit groans within us and intercedes wordlessly when we do not know what to pray. Perhaps Hymn 698 *Eternal Spirit of the living Christ* – which was sung at communion on August 2nd could be further inspiration for your ministry of intercession.

May this, then, be our renewed ministry for each of our parishes, our priests, our bishops, and our Church – to be women of Hope who pray and wait patiently, surrendering to the Holy Spirit to intercede as God alone knows best during this time of birthing new life! Thank you for all the support you have offered thus far.

PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGES

The DOK by-laws were last amended in October, 2007. At the Diocesan Board meeting on April 5, 2008, the officers and Chapter Presidents reviewed the Diocesan DOK by-laws and proposed several minor changes, which will be submitted at the Fall Assembly to the membership for discussion and consideration. These proposed changes would serve to acknowledge and affirm the importance of the Daughters At Large in our Assembly, would clarify the duties of the Diocesan Treasurer, and would also adjust the officer election criteria to more accurately reflect current practice.

The proposed changes are as follows:

- Article IV, Section 2A: The officers of the Assembly shall be elected by ~~a quorum of the Diocesan membership, either present at the Spring Assembly or via mail received by the majority vote of those members present at the Spring Assembly in the Triennial year.~~
- Article IV, Section B4D: ~~The Treasurer shall collect and disburse the regular gatherings of money to the Endowment, Master's and Self-Denial Funds of the National Order of The Daughters of the King, on an annual basis.~~

(This language will be revised and removed to Article III, Section 3, as follows:)

...upon death or resignation. All Chapters shall collect and disburse the regular gatherings of money to the Endowment, Master's and Self-Denial Funds of the National Order of The Daughters of the King, on an annual basis.

Proposed new article:

- Article VI. **Daughters at Large Chair**
The DAL Chair shall be appointed by the Executive Board

Section 1. The DAL Chair shall maintain contact at least once annually with DALs.
Section 2. Encourage DALs to join or form chapters when possible.
Section 3. Encourage DALs to participate in Diocesan Assemblies.
Section 4. DAL Chair shall represent DALs concerns and needs to the Executive Board.
- Current Article VI – **Parliamentary Authority** will become Article VII
- Current Article VII – **Amendment** will become Article VIII

All Daughters are encouraged to review the proposed changes and discuss them at your chapter meetings. Any concerns should be referred to your chapter president, who can bring them up for discussion at the next Board meeting on September 27, prior to the Fall Assembly at St. Paul's, Milwaukee, on November 1.

Prayer Warrior – A Memorial to Lorrie Erdman



Most of us will remember Lorraine Erdman as the woman who brought the Order of the DOK to Milwaukee. Largely through her efforts, the necessary three chapters were formed, which allowed us to constitute a Diocesan Assembly. Roger White, our Bishop at that time, became the National DOK Chaplain. Lorrie was passionate about DOK and encouraged me when I became involved.

Lorrie sent me lots of encouraging notes and called me a few times when the Chapter in Portage was forming - she reminded me often of how strong Spiritual Warfare can become when God calls women together to build His kingdom. She reminded me often that it was imperative to pray for each member and each prospective member and their families and to pray for the Parish ministries and the Priest on a daily basis. Lorrie was an asset to the Diocesan Order and the building of God's Kingdom.

I found Lorrie to be a very gracious woman. Even when she was ill she had time to give words of encouragement to others. Like many of us, she wasn't comfortable not being able to 'do' more. In one conversation, when I reminded her that she told me the best 'doing' we can do is Prayer because without that God isn't very involved and we aren't listening to His leading, she giggled a little and sweetly said, "Thank you for feeding me my own words." I thought that was an interesting comment for her to make. And I find I have to eat those words often. Our attempts at evangelism and service are pretty empty without prayer.

Lorrie was a phenomenal prayer warrior for the Lord. I think that's how many of us will remember her.

Daughters - At - Large

Do you consider yourself *just* a Daughter-at-Large? Please know that there is no such thing as a "second class Daughter" — for we are all called to be sisters in Christ. Currently we have between 15 and 20 members in our diocese that are not affiliated with a formal chapter.

Out of concern to keep these members connected with the larger community, the Executive Board is seeking a person to serve as Chair of the Daughters at large. We are also contacting each of these women to ascertain their reasons for not being connected with a local chapter.

If you are a Daughter at Large, even though the National Bylaws no longer require you to join another chapter within three years, we certainly encourage you to seek deeper bonds of affection with your sisters in the Order. If age or infirmity makes it harder for you to join with others in person for prayer and study, perhaps alternative ways to share can be found. Or if circumstances have simply taken you to a different church within the Apostolic succession, please consider speaking with your priest about the possibility of hosting an information session and starting a chapter in your parish.

Remember, it is even possible to start a chapter in a long-term care institution with proper spiritual guidance and support. Above all, let us remember to pray for one another, and to welcome Daughters at Large to our Assemblies!
